I had no idea where Lansdale was, let alone the special event that was happening there. Three years later, however, we moved here. My first impression of the church? It was too modern, quite a different style than the churches I had known. However, the lively spirit of the

parish family, shown through their participation in the Mass, quickly made me a fan – and a great believer in this community.

This has been my continued experience at St. Stanislaus Parish Church, through liturgies on ordinary days, and extraordinary ones on the special feasts of the year, as well as sacramental celebrations. St. Stanislaus Church was and is a powerful blessing to the entire parish family!

# Parishioner Spotlight

*Editor's Note: Due to an unfortunate printing error, the picture of Stan Skrzat in the last issue of NewStan was blached out for most readers. Out of respect for Stan, we have decided to reprint the picture and the article in its entirety. We apologize for the mishap.*

## Stan Skrzat

As I made my way through the Skilled Nursing area of Elm Terrace Gardens, I wondered how I'd find Stan Skrzat. I and my fellow Legionaries (members of the Legion of Mary) had previously known Stan and his wife Maggie, often helping wheel Maggie to the monthly Mass at Elm Terrace with Stan keeping a watchful eye from his self-propelled electric wheelchair. It had always been a pleasure for all of us when entering their shared room in Skilled Nursing to observe Stan keeping an ever-watchful eye on his beloved Maggie as she was slowly slipping into dementia. Last year, however, Maggie passed away, which was very hard for Stan, and he was transferred to a room of his own in the independent living area.

On this day, I was told he had been transferred to the hospital some time ago and had been very ill for a while. But now he had gotten over his condition and was back in the room that, until April of last year, he had shared with Maggie. Together, we went to the activity room on his floor and the curtain on his life was slowly raised...

Stan, the youngest of four boys, was born "Stanislaus" to Polish-born parents who lived at the time in Perkasio. When Stan was two, the family moved to Lansdale where he grew up attending the then-named Little Flower School. Stan recalled how he was picked to be an angel in 1st and 2nd grade and then "graduated" to altar boy. After graduation, he attended Lansdale High. Mass at St. Stanislaus Church was important to his Polish parents and Stan learned some words of Polish from his adoring mother.

As graduation neared in 1944, Stan's older brothers had already been "called to the colors." So Stan, wanting to be

a hero, applied to the Marines. When asked to "sign here," Stan hesitated. He asked if he could wait until his graduation from high school. No, he was told, they couldn't wait for his graduation to have him ship out, so he turned around, walked out, and went over to the Navy Recruiting Office. When he was asked there to "sign here," Stan asked, as before, "When?" The Navy said he could sign up right then, and they'd assign him to his first duty station at 709 W. Fourth St. (his home!) until graduation. So, it was that Stan graduated on a Thursday, and left home the next day for the Navy. He became a crewman on PGM (Patrol Gunboat, Motor)-22 for the duration of the war, participating in nine battle actions in the Pacific and then in the Battle of Okinawa. His gunboat wound up in



Kyushu Bay, Japan, working along minesweepers that would find and cut loose underwater mines. His boat would then blow up the surfaced mines.

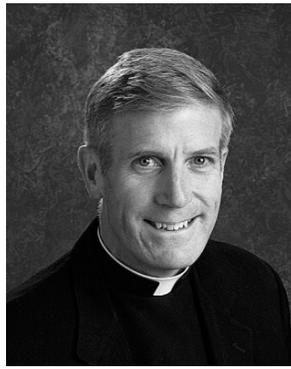
After the war, he qualified for Aviation Cadet training and joyfully got to go home early, hitch-hiking across the Pacific on various military flights to Pearl Harbor until obtaining a "ride" on a destroyer the last leg of the way to San Diego. From

there, Stan hitchhiked home to Philadelphia. He joined the cadet program at Bucknell University, but had to quit when he couldn't maintain a record in the top ten percent of the class. He was transferred to the Philadelphia Naval Yard for his remaining time in the Navy, serving two and a half years in total.

While home on leave at one point, he was driving around Lansdale in his uniform and spied a parked Model A Ford convertible "packed with girls." He pulled over and got out of his own car to look appreciatively at the Model A, the same model he dreamed of some day owning himself. One of the girls looked him over as well appreciating the way he looked in his uniform. Another girl arranged a double date with her Army boyfriend and that is how Stan met the girl with whom he would share his life, a pretty lass whose parents were native-born Scots. As Stan relays, they were inseparable even when going shopping.

# Parishioner Pondering

## *Memories of the Old St. Stanislaus*

My family moved here from Hatfield in 1960. I was 5 years old. By that time, the old church, built in 1910, was in very bad shape and literally falling apart. It was meant to hold 250 people, but now there were so many people wanting to go to Mass that loudspeakers mounted on stands were placed at the three exit doors in the front of the church for the people who could not fit into the building.

The exterior of the Church was ruggedly simple and made with beautiful stone. The bell tower was prominent. Upon entering the church, one got the real sense that you were at the scene of Calvary; painted high above the main altar, it was awe-inspiring. The altar was white marble with a depiction of the Last Supper scene carved into its front. Elevated above altar level were six candles, each about five feet high. At the end of this area were Gothic spires. My father told me it was no easy task to light the candles, since one could not see the wick. The Procession Cross that we use to this day is from that church.

How bad a shape was the church in? One early childhood memory is illustrative. At Mass one Sunday, while we were seated I placed my fingers in a gap which had opened up between the seat and the back of the pew due to the weight of the people sitting on the bench. When everyone stood up, the bench shifted back, closing the gap and closing over my fingers. My father always told me not to act up in Church so it was all I could do not to scream. Instead, I yanked with all my might on his suit coat, causing him to sit down, – and rescue my fingers as the gap reopened.

1962 brought change to St Stanislaus. Long-time Pastor Monsignor Joseph Shade died. The new pastor Father Paul Cahill saw an immediate need for a new church. I was in second grade in Little Flower Hall (where the primary grades were located at the time) when demolition of the old church began. It was hard enough for a seven year old to pay attention but the smashing of the wrecking ball made it more difficult.

The scale of the new church became evident as we watched the A-frame go up. Clearly there would be room in this structure for all. And we wouldn't have to watch our fingers anymore either!

So much of our Catholic iconography is contained in the

new St Stanislaus church. As Dianne Spotts points out in her article, we have often focused on features of the church in our articles and photos. However, next time you are there, try studying one panel at a time and see how inspired you are. The building may have been “completed” in 1964, but it was hardly finished when you consider what it continues to teach new and returning parishioners. The vision and loving attention to detail remain with us as we celebrate Mass or meet for fellowship today.✠
